Wednesday nights are our youth service that happens mid-week and they are a huge component to what we do at CWYG. Our goal is to provide a safe place to students to come and learn about God; a place where friends who don't know Jesus can be brought and meet Him.

\\CWYG SUNDAY MORNINGS

Sundays @ 9:00am in the Youth Wing.

Junior High Groups: Divide by grade and gender into individual classes. Their curriculum is built to build over their four years from Club 56 through 8th grade and covers Foundations (an overview of the whole Bible), the Life of Christ, and the start of the Church.

Senior High Groups: Divide into two mixed classes; one for 9th-10th and one for 11th-12th grade. Each of these classes teach Apologetics (defending your faith) on many different relevant topics to prepare students for life after high school.

WAYS TO SERVE

SMALL GROUP LEADER

Job Description: Leaders intentionally develop relationships with students in smaller group settings, in order to see God bring transformational change. They guide the conversation in small group times and work with assistant leaders. They make sure attendance is taken and help make decisions for the small group such as for All Small Group Nights. Leaders (and assistant leaders) are welcomed to build relationships and plan gatherings for their students outside youth group.

Commitment: Must attend weekend services at Colonial Woods on a regular basis (at least 2-3x a month) in addition to CWYG's Wednesday Night Service.

ASSISTANT LEADER

Job Description: Assistants work alongside the Small Group Leader with the same goals in mind but with more of a supportive role. Graduating high school students always start out as an assistant in our Jr. High Ministries.

Commitment: Must attend weekend services at Colonial Woods on a regular basis (at least 2-3x a month) in addition to CWYG's Wednesday Night Service.

SUNDAY SCHOOL TEACHER

Job Description: SS Teachers get to have the privilege of teaching the Word of God to our students on Sunday Mornings. We provide a complete curriculum through Student Life to make this process easier for our amazing teachers which gives you more resources and information than you'll need to prepare a lesson.

Commitment: Must attend weekend services at Colonial Woods on a regular basis (at least 2-3x a month). Download and Prepare Sunday School lesson beforehand from Student Life Website. Arrive by 9am in the morning. Sunday School begins **September 6th, 2015**

QUIZ LEADER

Job Description: These leaders work specifically with our Bible Quizzing team under the leadership of our Coaches. Roles may involve reading questions to the team for them to study with or traveling with them to churches to compete.

EXTRA ROLES

Job Description: Leaders who have a specific area of focus they wish to work in. Examples: Sound, Youth Café, Photography, Technology, Event Prep and Setup, Home Sponsor for Events.

WHAT IS A GROUP LEADER?

Small Group Leaders are vital to what we do at CWYG! Small Group Leaders are our most powerful tools in our attempt to partner with students and parents, because they are the people doing the majority of the hands-on ministry. Small Group Leaders serve as “another voice” in the lives of students. They are voices of love, encouragement, wisdom, and support for students. They are voices who are committed to doing whatever they can to help students engage in a vibrant relationship with God and in the story He wants to tell through their lives.

the qualifications

- Be a follower of Jesus in a growing relationship with Him.
- Be passionate about students and about their relationships with Jesus.
- Lead a lifestyle that is committed to Biblical standards.
- Have attended Colonial Woods for at least 6 months.
- Fill out a volunteer form which allows us to do a background check.

the expectations

- Attend your volunteer position at CWYG **consistently**. (Should you be unable to attend a specific week, you are responsible for contacting Pastor Dan, Pastor Chelsea and your fellow group leaders as well as give your group advance notice when possible.) We cannot stress enough how important consistency is for the health of your small group and for spiritual depth to be achieved. We are stewards of what God has placed in our lives. Steward your group well!
- Focus on facilitating discussions during small group time.
- Spend one full school year (now until the end of June) with your students.
- Connect with your students regularly outside of church (postcards, texts, phone calls, group parties, time on their turf, etc.)
- Be available to walk through difficult issues with your students if and when they arise.
- Practice safety and healthy boundaries with students at all times.
- Attend events for students and volunteers throughout the year.
- Attend our major **Leader Retreat on January 29-30, 2015** at Lake Huron Woods Retreat Center.

the benefits

- A ridiculous amount of fun!
- A powerful opportunity to invest in students and in their families that will forever change your walk with Jesus for the better.
- Lifelong influence in the lives of the students that you impact.

7 ESSENTIALS OF A SMALL GROUP LEADER

As a Small Group Leader, there are 7 things you'll need to keep in mind. Focus on these 7 essentials, and you'll be good to go!

1. IT'S A JOURNEY

Your role in your students' lives can best be described as a marathon, not a sprint. It takes time to develop relationships, trust, and influence with students. It doesn't happen automatically. It requires an investment of your time, love, and effort. That's why our Small Group Leaders commit to a year with their students (and encourage you to even continue through the full rotation of your class) - your relationships become stronger the more time you have together, resulting in valuable influence in their lives for years to come.

2. FACILITATE CONVERSATION

The primary role of Small Group Leaders is to develop relationships - not to lecture. You are primarily a facilitator of bible based discussion. So allow your students do the talking in small group time. Instead of TELLING them truth or how to apply the message, ASK the kind of questions that allow them to discover truth and practical application for themselves. Students want to be listened to and understood - so in small group time, let them do the talking. You do the listening + facilitating.

3. FOCUS ON FAITH

There's no easy way to say this so here it is... attending church is just the beginning of spiritual growth. Do you know what DOES have a huge impact on spiritual growth? Spending daily quiet time with God, telling others about Him, and giving back to God through service. That's why you're so important to a student's spiritual growth. We need you to help your students learn and practice spiritual disciplines because what happens in their everyday lives is way more important than what happens at church. While you aren't responsible for your students' spiritual growth (their parents are), you can still help your students develop faith that will change their relationships with God forever by modeling it through your own personal growth.

4. BUILD RELATIONSHIPS

20-30 minutes a week in small groups is not enough time to build relationships with your students. Not even close. In order to develop relationships, you'll need to invest some time and effort outside of CWYG. We'd suggest a Small Group Leader connecting with their students and/or parents once a week, have 3 or 4 hangouts (parties, sleepovers, etc.) each year, and do what you can to be present and involved in important days or experiences in their lives.

5. PARTNER WITH PARENTS

Always remember that parents are not only the greatest influence in a child's life naturally, but they are also the biblical authority in that child's life. No matter what you think of your students' parents, it's your job to encourage the relationship between students and their parents. And remember that, even though you can play a big part, you aren't responsible for your students' spiritual growth - their parents are. So in everything you do with your students, respect the parents and keep them involved and informed. Build relationships with them. Make sure they know who you are, why you want to invest in their kids' lives, and what your motives are. Be sure you always have their permission. Get their feedback on what you can do to help their family. If you fail to build strong bonds with parents, you will limit your ability to influence and invest in their children.

6. STAY IN BOUNDS

Small Group Leaders have a special and unique role in the Body of Christ. You're not just a warm body filling a need - you're doing valuable ministry! You are in a role that requires you to get pretty involved in students' lives, so it's absolutely essential for you to practice healthy boundaries, for the safety of both you and your students. Always maintain appropriate boundaries physically, emotionally, and relationally. If you have any questions or concerns about what may or may not be appropriate, just let us know. We'll help you navigate through those scenarios.

7. FILL UP FIRST

This is probably the most important of the 7 Essentials. As a Small Group Leader, you **MUST** be in a growing, dynamic relationship with Christ. We don't expect you to be perfect or to have it all together, but in order to pour into students' lives, you must first allow Jesus to fill you up.

OUR BELIEFS

In your ministry you might find it helpful to know where we stand as Colonial Woods Missionary Church on some core beliefs:

1. ONE GOD

There is but one eternal, all-powerful, all-knowing and everywhere-present Triune God. He is made up of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. He is the Creator and Sustainer of all things (Deut. 6:4-5; 1 Tim. 2:5)

2. JESUS CHRIST

He is God incarnate (in the flesh), yet human. He lived a sinless life, died to make atonement for the sins of all mankind. He was bodily resurrected and is now mediator at the right hand of the Father. He is assuredly coming in power and glory for his believing followers and is the ONLY way to the Father and to Heaven (John 1:1, 14; Titus 2:11-14).

3. HOLY SPIRIT

He convicts the world of sin, righteousness, and judgment. It is through the Holy Spirit's power that we are given new life when we repent of our sins and believe in the Lord Jesus Christ. He sanctifies (makes holy), empowers, teaches, guides and comforts believers (John 16:7-8, 12-15).

4. THE BIBLE IS GOD'S WORD.

The Bible is Word of God, inspired by God the Father and written through human authors under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Because it is the Word of God it is the complete authority in all matters it addresses and is without error (2 Tim. 3:16; 2 Peter 1:20-21).

5. SALVATION

Salvation (how we are saved) is the result of genuine repentance from sin and faith in the atoning work of Christ. This new birth takes place when we confess with our mouths and believe in our hearts in Jesus Christ. (Titus 3:5; Romans 10:9-10).

6. CHURCH

The Church is not just made up of Colonial Woods or even of just our denomination. The Church is made up of all believers past, present and future, who have been united together by faith to Christ who is its living head (Matthew 16:18; Hebrews 12:22-24).

7. ORDINANCES

We believe there are two Christian ordinances: baptism and communion. We believe they are outward acts appointed by Christ to be administered in each church. We are NOT saved through these acts, rather they are marks of our obedience and faith (Acts 8:36; 1 Cor. 11:24-34).

HOT TOPICS

Our world is a dark place dealing with some tough topics. We want to make sure that we don't shy away from these topics but to speak into them with the truth and love of God's Word.

HOMOSEXUALITY

We believe that the Bible is very clear that living a homosexual lifestyle is a sexual sin in the same way that pre-marital sex or an affair is sexual sin. However, it is our role as Christians to love ALL people since we are all sinners in equal need of God's grace. As a church, we welcome ALL people to worship and seek God here because Jesus meets us exactly where we are yet but thankfully, he loves us too much to leave us there. We do not allow those living in any kind of sexual sin to operate leadership positions within the church. We also will not perform such marriages that would cause us step outside of our beliefs on this issue. Should you have a student who is struggling with homosexuality (or any other sexual sin) we'd appreciate it if you would let us know so that we can work together as team to best minister into their specific needs. If you would like to dig into this deeper, feel free to ask us for a copy of our denomination's official articles regarding this topic (Leviticus 18:22; 20:13; 1 Cor. 6:1-11; 7:2; 1 Tim. 1:8-10; Romans 1:18-32).

ADDICTIONS

While we often think of addictions referring to drugs or alcohol, an addiction can be anything that we rely and depend on rather than Christ. Food, cigarettes, sugar, video games, movies, music; all of these can be addictions and so we must recognize them in our own lives first in order to help students particularly struggling with any addiction (1 John 2:16; 1 Cor. 6:9-12).

ALCOHOL

To sum it up and keep it simple, the Bible says getting drunk is a sin, however drinking itself isn't. We understand that this is an area of personal conviction and that many within our church have differing views on it, and so we ask that whether you drink a glass of wine occasionally or whether you abstain, remember you are a role model for the students within your small group and they absorb everything you say and do. Always be respectful of the decisions their parents have made in their own home when expressing your own. Drinking is NEVER acceptable when with a student. And drinking for a student is always wrong because they are under-aged and the Bible is also clear about obeying the laws of the land (Romans 13:1-7, Galatians 5:21; 1 Cor. 6:12).

HELL

There have been many conversations within the Christian community of late as to whether Hell even exists or if anyone goes there. Well, let's just clear that up, it DOES. The Bible talks about hell about twice as much as it does heaven. That isn't to be depressing, it's to help us know that it does exist and Jesus really doesn't want us to go there! Jesus knew that our world would try and tell us it doesn't exist or that if you are good you can go to heaven but that is NOT true. The only way to Heaven is through Jesus Christ. (John 14:6; 2 Thes. 1:8-9; Hebrews 9:27)

TRANSGENDER ISSUES

The transgender conversation is similar to the Homosexual one in many ways. First and foremost we have to remember that our role is to focus on the Gospel. That is our goal. God originally created two distinct and complementary sexes (Gen. 1:27; Matt. 19:4) but one of the effects of the Fall is that some persons experience gender confusion. Because gender is so closely tied to a person's identity it is such an important component of human personhood and cannot be tampered with without individuals suffering untold harm. Gender is rooted in creation rather than culture. We do not condone the actions of those who seek to chemically or surgically alter their biologically indicated gender, we must sympathize with the "gender dysphoria" that inclines them to do so. In our youth group specifically, we will handle these situations on a case by case basis (as far as how we handle small group situations; should they go to a girls or a guys small group; trips and events, etc). If you would like to dig into this deeper, feel free to ask us for a copy of our denomination's official articles regarding this topic.

SHARING JESUS WITH STUDENTS

SHARING GOD'S BIG STORY

This method of sharing the Gospel is based on the idea of God's Story - the story of creation, the fall of man, and God's offer and promise of salvation and redemption. Too often, our former methods of sharing Jesus have often been guilty of communicating only a small part of Jesus' message. But by telling students about God's Big Story, we hope to better capture their attention and hearts, while presenting Jesus' message more fully and relevantly. It helps them see how their story (or testimony) is a smaller part of God's bigger story of redemption.



HOW TO ASK JESUS TO BE YOUR SAVIOR

As a leader you may get an opportunity to lead a student to Christ down at the altar or in your small group. It's easy to get nervous and feel like you are doing it wrong but it is as easy as your ABC's...

- A- Admit** you are a sinner and in need of a Savior
- B- Believe** in your heart that Jesus Christ is Lord. That he really was the Son of God who died on a cross and rose again to pay the price of your sins so that you may have a relationship with God.
- C- Confess** with your mouth out loud that all of this is true (this often done as a prayer to God) and then Commit to living the rest of your life under this truth!

"For if you declare with your mouth, 'Jesus is Lord' and believe in your heart that God him from the dead, you will be saved. For it is with your heart that you believe and are justified, and it is with your mouth that you profess your faith and are saved." -Rom. 10:9-10

BAPTISM

I. Why should I be baptized?

- A.** To follow the example set by Christ (Mark 1:9)
- B.** Because Christ commanded it (Matthew 28:19-20)
- C.** It demonstrates that I am a follower of Christ (1 John 2:3)

II. What is the meaning of Baptism?

- A.** It illustrates Christ's death, burial, and resurrection (1 Corinthians 15:3-4)
- B.** It illustrates my new life as a Christian. (11 Corinthians 5:17, Romans 6:4)
- C.** Baptism doesn't make you a Christian. Only your faith in Christ does that. Baptism is like a wedding ring – it's the outward sign of the commitment you have made in your heart (Ephesians 2:8-9).

III. Why be Baptized by Immersion?

- A.** Because Jesus was baptized that way (Matthew 3:16)
- B.** Every baptism in the Bible was by immersion (Acts 8:38-39)
- C.** The word "baptize" means "to dip under water".
- D.** It best symbolizes a burial and resurrection (see Romans 6:1-11)

IV. Who Should be Baptized?

Every person who has believed in Christ. A Believer is someone who has realized that their sin separated them from God. They have given up all efforts to reach God through good works or religious activity. They have concluded that Jesus Christ's death on the cross for their sins is the only thing that can bridge the gap between them and God. A Believer is someone who has decided to trust Christ alone for his or her salvation. If you have come to that point in your spiritual journey, then you are ready to be baptized (Acts 2:41; 8:12-13).

V. When Should I Be Baptized?

As soon as you have believed. "Those who believed were baptized that day!" (Acts 2:41, Acts 8:35-38).

VI. Does this Mean it Has to be Immediately?

No, what the Bible is trying to teach is that baptism should follow your decision to become a Christ-follower. There is no reason to delay. If you wait until you are "good" enough, you will never feel ready for baptism.

STAY IN BOUNDS

As an adult volunteer, it is absolutely essential that you practice healthy boundaries with students at all times...for their safety, and for yours. These guidelines exist to protect students from harm, and to protect you from false allegations.

And keep in mind, while these guidelines apply to your interactions with all students, they are absolutely **INDISPUTABLE** when dealing with students not of your gender.

NEVER BE ALONE WITH A STUDENT

If you need to have a private conversation with a student, have the conversation in a public place - not behind closed doors or in a room or vehicle alone. Here are some tips to help you navigate through this particular guideline...

- * **MEETING WITH A STUDENT.** Do not set up one-on-one meeting with students without the knowledge and consent of their parents. When choosing your meeting place choose a public setting where people are.
- * **TRANSPORTATION.** Avoid transporting a student anywhere alone. If possible, arrange to have another adult or student ride with you. If you are ever uneasy with a situation, remember it is okay to say "no".

MAINTAIN PHYSICAL BOUNDARIES

Be wise, be wise, be wise. Maintain healthy and safe physical boundaries with students at all times. This means setting boundaries for yourself, but it may also mean setting and enforcing boundaries with students who push physical limits.

LOG ELECTRONIC CONVERSATIONS

When you find yourself in the midst of a sensitive conversation with a student, keep in mind that words and intentions can be misconstrued - intentionally or unintentionally. Any time you are engaged in a serious conversation with a student, save or log your conversations (take screen shots, paste text into a Word document, save text messages and emails). This may seem excessive, but if you're ever falsely accused of misconduct from a student or parent, you'll be glad you did it.

REPORT DANGEROUS SITUATIONS

If a student ever says, "I need to tell you something, but you can't tell anyone," never agree. Let them know that you want to help them and that you will only tell if it will help. If the information is that the student is being hurt, may hurt themselves, or may hurt someone else you **MUST REPORT** it to Pastor Dan or Pastor Chelsea. Report any of these cases (proven or potential) immediately.

CODE OF CONDUCT

WORK HARD

*"Do your best. Work from the heart for your real Master, for God...
Keep in mind always that the ultimate Master you're serving is Christ."
-Colossians 3:23 (The Message)*

You are so important to what we do at CWYG - we need you, in everything you do, to do it to the best of your ability. Show up on time. Give it your all. Be faithful with the responsibilities entrusted to you. Remember, you are in ministry- you aren't just serving Christ in theory, you are directly impacting the Body of Christ and the Kingdom of God. So glorify God in your work! See a need, fill a need! Don't feel like you have to wait for us to ask you.

BE KIND

*"Get along amongst yourselves... Be patient with each person, attentive to individual needs. And be careful that when you get on each other's nerves you don't snap at each other. Look for the best in each other, and always do your best to bring it out." -1 Thessalonians 5:13-15
(The Message)*

Ministry is all about people - so to be effective in ministry, you'll need to reflect God's heart for people. So with students, parents, other volunteers, (and especially your youth pastors!), always treat others with gentleness, forgiveness, patience, kindness, and love.

BE LIKE JESUS

"Watch what God does, and then do it, like children who learn proper behavior from their parents." - Ephesians 5:1 (The Message)

Small Group Leaders, students are watching you. Because of your position, your words, choices, and relationship with God will be carefully observed and replicated by the students that you influence. While we know we are all sinners in need of a Savior, we do expect you to be striving to make wise decisions and glorify God with your life and choices. We've identified a few areas in particular in which a Small Group Leader must practice the utmost degree of wisdom, discretion, and holiness...

- * **SEXUAL PURITY.** Small Group Leaders must abstain from all forms and degrees of extramarital sex, homosexual activity, pornography, and any kind of sexual impurity (1 Corinthians 6:18-20).

- * **ALCOHOL + DRUG USE.** We do expect leaders to exercise wisdom and restraint, understanding that our personal freedom in Christ must first be subject to the spiritual growth and well being of other believers (Titus 1:7, Romans 14, 1 Timothy 3:3). No CWYG volunteer may consume alcohol in the presence of our students. Drug and underage alcohol use is never acceptable.
- * **ONLINE ACTIVITY.** When online, Small Group Leaders must separate themselves from all questionable photos, language, or content (Ephesians 4:29, 5:3-4), maintaining an online presence that is above reproach. Here's a tip: if the parent of a 5th grader wouldn't want their child to see something that you've posted, then it's inappropriate.
- * **ATTITUDE.** Sometimes it's the little things that disqualify us from effective ministry. All CWYG volunteers are expected to strive to look like Jesus by exhibiting humble, teachable spirits, particularly in the midst of conflict or correction, and is asked to be respectful and not voice critical opinions of any church, staff, volunteer, parent, or student in front of a student.
